FARMING NEWS

The 2025 combinable crops harvest is well under way in the East Riding, with the autumn sown barley and oilseed rape now complete and in the barn. The yields so far have only been a little below average, which is remarkable considering how little rain we have had during the growing season. The first combines around here were out harvesting the barley on the lighter land in the first week of July - which is the earliest I can remember for many a year. The off-farm prices of the grains and seeds, however, are still falling, and I wonder sometimes if the efforts of a whole year's work for a marginal return make me feel is it all worthwhile! Of course it is. That's what we do, come rain or shine, and the politicians know it. Our irrigation lake is getting rather low now, which is not surprising, and the potatoes look good with all the water that has been sprayed on them. I often think that catchpit water is at a higher temperature than a borehole so it does not give the crop such a shock.

Vivergo is the name of an industrial bioethanol plant at Saltend, Hull that turns poorer quality wheat, that is not good enough for bread etc., into ethanol, animal feed, and even the NHS use carbon dioxide which is also produced during the process. Most of the wheat is sourced from farms in the Yorkshire – Lincolnshire area. All the above is at risk after the government agreed a trade deal with the USA which reduced the import tariff on bioethanol from 19% to nil, opening the door to much cheaper imports from across the pond. This would probably make the Hull plant unviable. The closure would involve around 180 job losses, and deny many farmers in this region a ready market for their wheat. We already have fuels with 10% ethanol added, and some suggest it should be increased further to 20% ethanol. However, some vehicle engines may cough and splutter with this increase.


We farmers use glyphosate on fields to provide a clean entry for the next crop by eradicating wicks/ twitch /couch grass or whatever you want to call it. Gardeners also use the chemical which is sold in small packs under various trade names. However it has been found to be less effective when mixed with hard water which is predominant in our area. This could result in some grassweed resistance by delivering a sub—optimal kill. 30% efficacy could be lost due to the calcium and magnesium in hard water binding with

the active components. Gardeners could use a water softener but it would be difficult to add this to a 4,000 litre spray tank.

A recent survey questioning farmers on farms, at markets, and at shows, in North Yorkshire, has suggested that many found it easier and more comfortable to seek medical advice from a vet rather than a GP. Many farmers struggle to take time off due to the constant demands of looking after livestock and crops, and prioritise their work over health and wellbeing. In the survey, which was carried out mainly with about 200 stock farmers, it was found that many were worried about confidentiality in small communities. Some cited disclosing mental health issues to a doctor could lead to their gun licences being revoked. Time constraints, logistical challenges, lack of awareness, geographical isolation and stigma all contributed to delays in seeking help from a GP. We all know that the health service is under pressure, partly to do with an ageing population and the ability to access more life enhancing treatments.

A final thought: maybe electric cars are another way of reducing the number of pensioners, like me, roaming the streets. While their silence is viewed as one of the benefits, if your hearing is not too good you are twice as likely to be in collision with an electric vehicle than a younger person!

Summer update from Statkraft

What's the latest on Soay Solar & Greener Grid Park?

Construction of the BESS phase is nearing completion, and the team continue to prepare for construction of the solar phase. We have committed to holding a Drop-In session for residents before solar construction commences and keeping our project website updated - www.statkraft.co.uk/soay

Is Statkraft connected to other local Battery Energy Storage Sytems (BESS) projects?

We are aware there is some confusion as to the projects Statkraft are involved in locally. We are happy to clarify that Statkraft have two projects in East Riding – the consented Soay Solar and Greener Grid Park and the Mylen Leah Solar Farm, which is in early stage development. BESS forms no part of our plans for Mylen Leah – if consented, the project would have a direct connection to the National Grid and no need for battery storage.


In summary, Statkraft have no links to current BESS applications in the area, and we are not reliant on these getting consent or being built, in order to operate.

Spotlight on Solar

The world is embracing solar power on a scale we haven't seen before – in 2024 solar was the largest and fastest-growing source of new electricity globally. Solar power is key to our clean energy future – both on rooftops and as part of solar farms.

VALEWATCH

This is the farm watch and rural crime group for the Pocklington and Market Weighton areas. The local volunteer-led group applied for a Community Safety Partnership grant from the Humberside Office of the Police & Crime Commissioner. They received nearly £3,700 of funding to support their initiative to purchase trailer marking kits to help protect their owners from theft.

David Horsley, Chairman of ValeWatch, said "whilst many types of rural crime in East Yorkshire have seen significant decreases in the last couple of years, trailer theft is a notable exception. Trailer thefts are particularly significant because they're usually connected to other criminality – a stolen trailer or horsebox is often loaded up with items such as quad bikes, machinery, tools and equipment either from the same victim or nearby properties."

According to data from The Equipment Register, one in ten second-hand trailers listed for sale is flagged as stolen. This unsettling figure underscores a growing epidemic that is plaguing the agricultural and equestrian communities.

PC Rich Fussey of the Humberside Police Rural Task Force said "initiatives such as this not only reduce the attractiveness of trailers to thieves but also help us to reunite stolen items with their rightful owners even where the serial number has been removed."



Officers from the Rural Task Force have already been out in Meltonby supporting the project by fitting the kits to trailers and providing other free property marking solutions to help farms and rural businesses better protect themselves from theft.

Leo Hammond, Deputy Police & Crime Commissioner for Humberside said "we are committed to ensuring rural communities get their fair share of policing. Supporting the hard working volunteers of farm watch groups, like ValeWatch, is key to that."

"These kits are so important because as our Commissioner, Jonathan Evison says; the best way to support a victim of crime is to stop them becoming a victim in the first place."

ValeWatch, with over 220 members, is the largest rural crime group in the East Riding, and covers the western reaches of the Humberside Police area. Subscribers benefit, not only from text and e-mail alerts about local crime and suspicious activity, but also have the opportunity to access free property marking worth hundreds of pounds.

EAST RIDING'S HIDDEN LIFESAVERS - THROWLINES AT KEY WATER SPOTS



As the warmer months draw more people to our rivers, lakes and coastline, Humberside Fire and Rescue Service, in partnership with East Riding of Yorkshire Council, is urging everyone to stay vigilant around open water.

The Humber region is known for its natural beauty, but its waterways also pose real risks, particularly from cold water shock, hidden currents and sudden slips near the edge.



Whether you're walking by the river, enjoying a day out by the sea, or fishing at a pond, it's vital to understand how to stay safe and respond in an emergency.

Last year a number of throwlines, specialist lifesaving equipment designed to help people in trouble in the water, were installed at multiple high-risk locations across the East Riding, including: Beverley Beck, High Eske, Tickton Bridge, Sugar Mill Ponds in Rawcliffe, North Frodingham, Goole Marina. Each site includes clear instructions on how to use the throwline in an emergency, making sure that bystanders can act quickly and confidently if someone is in difficulty.

Sarah Wilkinson, Head of Prevention at Humberside Fire and Rescue Service, said: "Our water safety campaign is all about equipping people with the knowledge they need to enjoy the water safely. Tragically, in recent years, young lives have been lost at local waterways, despite the heroic efforts of our firefighters and emergency service teams.

GARDEN JOBS FOR AUGUST

August is usually one of the hottest months, though maybe this year, after one or two hot, dry spells already, it will be different. After the colour and abundance of June and July, there is work to do to maintain a flourishing and inviting garden.



Many plants such as lupins, peonies, and irises have probably completed their flowering cycle now, and deadheading will keep them looking tidier and, for lupins, could encourage a second flush of blooms. Hardy geraniums may be looking straggly and will soon look all the better if they are cut to the ground and watered – new foliage will grow back. Other perennials such as campanulas, penstemons, phlox, heleniums and dahlias are hopefully flowering away happily and filling your garden with colour.

Annuals including pelargoniums, sweet peas, marigolds, zinnias and verbenas will benefit from regular picking and deadheading – all of which will encourage more flowers to form. However you may wish to leave some sweet pea pods to ripen allowing you to collect seeds for sowing next year.



After the first wonderful flush of roses during late May and June do take



time to survey your roses – rambling, climbing, shrub or bush. Many roses will flower again during the summer but may need some attention. If there are signs of black spot (pictured) do remove the affected leaves but don't compost them. Deadhead plants regularly unless one of the attractions of your roses is the

formation of colourful rosehips, and feed your roses if you are expecting a continuation of flowering.

Watering any plants in containers is likely to be a daily or even twice daily operation and is best carried out early morning or early evening to reduce water loss through evaporation. A weekly feed could be beneficial. To keep your plants happy and healthy do enlist the help of neighbours if you are planning to be away.



Beautiful scented English lavenders (angustifolia Hidcote and Munstead) will have been attracting bees all summer but when flowering dies down, towards the end of August, cut it back by about two thirds but don't cut into bare wood on older plants. This will keep your plants looking compact.

There is still time in early August to take plant cuttings if you wish to increase your plant stock for next year. Why not try to propagate honeysuckle, lavender or clematis in this way. The RHS website offers a wealth of advice on propagating different plants. Go to www.rhs.org.uk

Growers of strawberries and redcurrants will hopefully have enjoyed

bumper crops this year and will now be finding their plants require some attention. After strawberry cropping has finished, cut off old leaves to allow fresh leaves to develop. Also, remove any straw mulch to prevent a build-up of



pests and diseases, and take off netting so birds can feed on any pests. For redcurrants - once they have finished fruiting in late summer - just prune back any unwanted growth. Start by clearing out the centre to allow better air circulation (think of a wine goblet and you won't go far wrong) and then cut back any new growth by about half to keep the plant in check.

Enjoy the rest of summer and come September it will be time to choose spring bulbs again!



THE POWER OF LOVE

The Jewish Rabbi, Harold Kushner, tells the story of a small boy being sent to the corner shop for some groceries for his mother. Time ticks by and long after his mother expected him, he still hasn't returned. She becomes quite worried. Eventually the little boy returns and unaware of how worried his mum has been, he's surprised when he receives a scolding. 'What kept you? Why were you so long?' she asks.

'I'm sorry mum,' he replies, 'but on my way home I met my friend and his bicycle had broken, so I stopped to help him.' 'But child,' the exasperated mother continued, 'you are far too small and young for such things, you know nothing about mending bikes!' 'I know that mum. So, I just sat down on the pavement next to him and I helped him cry.'

This story reminds me of a modern day 'Good Samaritan' parable which Jesus told about showing abundant unconditional and indiscriminate love and compassion. This can be in very specific and practical acts of kindness, like the Samaritan who cared for the Jew who had been mugged. But sometimes, it can be as simple as taking the time to be with someone in their pain and sorrow, listening to them and weeping with them, just like the little boy did with his friend with the broken bike. Sometimes this alone has the power to bring comfort, healing, and peace.

A missionary translator, struggling with the language of a tribe in the mountains of Mexico, tried to get the right word to explain 'comfort.' Then one of his helpers asked for a week's leave explaining that his uncle had died and he wanted some days off to visit his grieving aunt 'to help her heart around the corner.' This was exactly the expression for 'comfort' the translator needed. I love it!

We might not be able to fix someone else's problems, like the little boy couldn't fix his friend's bike, but we can all find a way 'to help a heart around the corner.' This is the power of abundant, unconditional and indiscriminate love and compassion. A love that has its source in the God I believe in.

Homemade Jam now on sale



The funeral of Mrs Doreen Paul, a former churchwarden of St Michael's Church, Thornton, was held on the 7th May. Doreen was born in Brighton, on the 16th March 1937 to Earnest and Gertrude Peacock (Nee Palfreyman).

During the war, Doreen and the family moved up to East Yorkshire, her mother's birthplace, settling in Thornton, where they lived for



many years. Doreen's father eventually became the postman for the area and was a familiar face to many in the local villages.

Doreen grew up in Thornton, embracing the church and its values and married her beloved husband Stan there in 1959. They had four children together before Stan sadly passed away in 1983.

In later years she assumed the role of churchwarden at St Michael's, also helping out with village fetes, cake stalls and selling poppies for the Royal British Legion. It was a role that continued with the help of friends when she moved to Wold Garth in Pocklington.

Whilst at Wold Garth, Doreen loved spending time with her four grandchildren and eight great grandchildren, and enjoying crafts such as knitting and crochet. She'd grown up with pets too, always having a dog or cat around, sometimes both, and had two companion cats at Wold Garth.

Poor health eventually meant she had to give up her role as churchwarden, but the church and Thornton village were always of great importance to her. She had many happy memories of Thornton and could recall, with astonishing accuracy, stories of the village and its people in days past - she'd had long friendships with many of them. One of these stories was of the marl pond, down Church Lane, and of the Land Army girls who had dug out most of it for material for bricks.

Sadly, at the age of 88, Doreen passed away on 8th April 2025. She will be both deeply missed and fondly remembered by her family and all who knew her.


